

## NHS Lothian Paediatric Audiology Review

The British Academy of Audiology is deeply saddened by the findings of the NHS Lothian Paediatric Audiology Review. The report into Paediatric Audiology at the Lothian Health Board is both distressing and concerning for the children and families affected and the professionals involved in hearing care.

The profession we represent has a main aim of improving the quality of life for those with hearing difficulty. This has not happened for those children and families highlighted in the review. The lifelong impact that undiagnosed and untreated hearing loss has on individuals and families cannot be underestimated.
